Domestic Bees FAQs

An overview for homeowners



What are the maximum number of hives I may have?

Properties must have a minimum of 4,000 sq. ft. to have an apiary.

2 hives	4,000 sq. ft. to 11,000 sq. ft
4 hives	11,001 sq. ft to 43,560 sq. ft
5 or more hives	43,560 sq. ft or more: 4 hives plus 1 additional hive per 3,000 sq. ft. of lot area over 43,560 sq. ft.

Where may I place hives on my property?

Hives must be placed in the rear yard, and meet the following setbacks:

- 25 feet from a street, sidewalk, or a lot line
- 35 feet from adjacent houses
- 50 feet from penned/kenneled animals
- 50 feet from educational facilities, child care/day-care centers, assisted living facilities, etc.

What is involved in the care and maintenance of apiaries?

- Water: Fresh water must be located within 20 ft. of hives.
- Flyway barriers: Barriers must be placed parallel between the hive opening and within 25 ft. of lot lines. Wall and solid fence barriers must be between 6ft.–7ft. tall. If vegetation barriers are used, the plants must be at least 4 ft. tall, but may grow taller than 7ft.

What is a flyway barrier?

 A flyway barrier is a barrier consisting of either a wall, solid fence, dense vegetation intended to force bees to fly at least six feet above the hive.

Can I sell the honey I get from my hives?

 Yes! Sale operations from home-based business need to first obtain a Home-Occupation permit and business license. What are the application requirements?

- **Zoning Certification**: The application is found on the City website, and has a \$50 application fee.
- House Location Survey: This is a scaled survey created by a Land Surveyor that shows an aerial view of your property. The proposed apiary location should be drawn on it, along with the distance to the property lines.
- Bee and Apiary Form: This form is found on the City website and indicated the applicants understanding of the City code section for apiaries.

When is a permit not required?

• If existing hives are replaced.
