MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

The fiscal year 2008 saw many challenges, accomplishments and successes for the Manassas Museum System. Through the efforts of a dedicated staff performing, in many cases, “beyond the call of duty,” and a Historic Resources Board that took a greater lead in strengthening the overall operations of the system, we were able to provide outstanding educational, historical and cultural programs and services for the community.

As the year began, the Museum System was greatly understaffed. During this period, board members assisted staff in the development of the 2008 Work Plan, the first Business Plan, and the Collections Management Policy. Each of these plans strengthened the institution’s overall operation and made us accountable to our “stakeholders,” i.e., community residents, Museum Associate Members, our visitors, and city officials.



Accomplishments for this year have been numerous and reflect the goals set forth in the Annual Work Plan.

- All staff positions were filled
- Exhibits displayed a greater number of items from the permanent collection and highlighted many citizens from the local community
- Product development for income producing items in the gift shop coincided with the theme of exhibits on view
- Several partnerships with other community groups were created to support our mission
- Well marketed and attended programs for adults and children continued throughout the year
- The review and creation of a workable data base of the Historic District Survey was completed
- Representation in the Downtown Sector Plan continued
- Visitor satisfaction is at an all-time high
- Major building maintenance and documentation of the contents of the Speiden-Carper House were completed
- Great strides were made in the final stages of the phase 1 of Liberia House Restoration
- Construction drawings for the Museum Expansion project are nearing completion

Success of any institution is due to the individuals who create the excitement of challenging others to become involved. The Manassas Historic Resources Board is composed of 15 individuals who represent the business, government, historical and education sectors of our community. The seven full-time, four seasonal and two part-time staff members operate the Museum System at the highest professional level and are to be commended for their dedication and enthusiasm.

Priorities for the coming year begin our challenges again. Foremost will be the formation of a Capital Campaign Committee to assist in raising the needed capital for the construction of the museum expansion project. With this expansion, that is so desperately needed, the Museum will be able to offer our ever changing community the cultural and educational opportunities it deserves. We anticipate and look to you for continued support so that we will remain an integral part of the community for future generations.

COLLECTIONS/ACQUISITIONS

The strength of the collection, and all it enables us to do, is something we do not take for granted. It represents the cumulative efforts of several decades with dedicated board members, curators, directors and, even more significant, the sustained commitment of a community of citizens who have understood the value of acquiring historical items and sharing them with the public. We continue to honor that commitment today through the focused development of a collection that remains our single most important resource.

Among the highlights of the year:

- Added 760 items and 4 lots of extensive archival material to the permanent collection
- Added over 200 pieces of information to the Historical Files
- Added over 30 new history publications to the McBryde Library
- Approved a Collections Management Policy to guide the growth and care of the collection
- Began a Teaching Collection for hands-on learning
- Inventoried contents of the Speiden Carper House
- Cross-referenced Manassas Historic Buildings Survey to other files and photographs
- Valuation of Collection increased by over 10%
- Professional services provided through workshops for the community and internships

EDUCATION

In Fiscal 2008, the Manassas Museum Education division offered a variety of educational opportunities for visiting adults, children, schools, and toddlers through programs, summer camps, book signings, and holiday events.

- 390 students from Prince William, Fairfax, and Loudon counties visited the Museum or one of its seven satellite sites on field trips.
- 486 students in grades 1-5 were treated to in-classroom programs presented by our 19th century clad staff.
- 905 students were instructed by their teachers using lesson plans, trunk programs and handouts designed by Museum staff.
- 90 children attended Toddler Tuesday programs.
- 429 participants attended the following programs:

PUBLIC PROGRAMS

Both paid and free public programs during the year attracted a diverse audience to the Museum System.

Families visiting the popular Manassas Historic Railway Festival and Edgar Rohr Memorial Antique Car Meet found specially themed crafts and scavenger hunts awaiting at the Museum. More scavenger hunts were developed to meet the needs of a wider age range of everyday visitors.

Young and young-at-heart visitors experiencing the Civil War Soldier changing exhibit found a new children's corner where visitors listened to the sounds of battle and exclaimed over the variety of bugs and vermin often found in soldier's food and clothing.

While fireflies danced in the distance and warm breezes fluttered across the Museum's lawn, families spread blankets and chairs to enjoy the free summer movie series *Fabulous Films of '57 and '58*. During the winter, families again crowded the Candy Factory's Keller Theater for a glimpse at 1950's era Manassas in the locally filmed *My Son John*.

The Summer Sounds concert series, co-sponsored with The Center for the Arts, drew hundreds of families to the lawn for free musical entertainment.

A new partnership with the Prince William Symphony took advantage of the superb acoustics of the main



gallery for three concerts during the winter months.

Participants in The Spirited Past of Manassas walking tours followed the lanterns of costumed interpreters as they related eerie—but true—stories about the city's past, and ended on the lawn for a visit with the Blackhorse Cavalry.

Ladies and gentlemen wearing their finest enjoyed the historic surroundings of Liberia Mansion, musical entertainment, and fine tea fare during the Winter Holiday and Mother-Daughter Teas.

Throngs of visitors enjoying the annual Christmas tree lighting on the lawn, stopped by the Museum for refreshments, free admission, and a visit with Santa.

Talented youth singers and step dancers from the Manassas First Baptist Church again filled the gallery to capacity with a rousing free performance in honor of Black History Month.

One hundred nine volunteers of all ages wearing thick work gloves and sturdy shoes ventured into the woods and every corner of the property surrounding Liberia Mansion to remove debris and spruce up the grounds during the annual Park Day clean up sponsored by the Civil War Battlefield Preservation Trust.

Children in grades three through five delighted in learning new skills while participating in both summer and spring break Civil War Boot Camp and summer Spy Camps.

Exuberant young boot campers wearing either Confederate or Union colors, faced off in what has become a summer tradition of Capture the Flag with a ready supply of water balloons, and walked the sacred ground of The Manassas National Battlefield Park to lend levity to their study of the war. Campers fresh from a session demonstrated drilling techniques with wooden muskets for a Fox News Washington Channel 5 live broadcast in July of 2007.

Spy campers testing spy tools and techniques during the traditional camp-ending scavenger hunt through Old Town, were having too much fun to notice they had learned a thing or two about sleuthing.

A YEAR IN EXHIBITIONS

Changing exhibitions increase the Museum's ability to highlight the permanent collections, collaborate with private collectors, and keep the galleries fresh for repeat visitors.

In the past year, the Museum added a new changing exhibition space in the main gallery, enabling two simultaneous changing exhibitions, and organized four in-house exhibitions.

These exhibitions involved the entire Museum staff in initiating, organizing, curating, loan agreements, packing and transport, design, construction and installation, and marketing.

Civil War Era

The Civil War Soldier: Daily Life in the Bloodiest War Through October 2008

This exhibit takes viewers through the soldier's life as he went to war, lived in camp, experienced battle, was wounded or captured, and returned home.

Illustrated by an outstanding collection of artifacts, first-hand accounts, and photographs, the soldier's story comes alive with sound effects and a hands-on experience of a chilling aspect of camp life.

History/Photography

Manassas through the Lens: Photography by Howard Churchill

Very few community events, club fairs, civic events, or weddings between 1943 and 1980 escaped the lens of Howard Churchill. Visitors experienced that era again through his photographs. Families ordered many prints from the exhibition to enrich their memories.

Prince William County/Manassas in the 1930s as Photographed by W.H. Lamb

Never-before-seen photographs from the W. H. Lamb Collection. Lamb worked for and possibly was editor of the Manassas Journal in the 1930s and later. His rural and community photographic images offer a rare glimpse of pre-WWII Manassas and Prince William County. Prepared for the Museum cabin at Heritage Days in Prince William Forest Park.

MUSEUM EXPANSION

Expansion plans for the Museum have been in the works since 2006. The design and approval process for the Museum expansion is complete and the design firm Ewing Cole of Washington, D.C. has been contracted to create the construction documents in the final phase of work before construction bidding can take place.

The planned new addition to the Museum will double the current square footage and provide a better storage and exhibition environment for the more than 5,000 objects and 200 cubic feet of archival materials and special library collections. New exhibit spaces will help the Museum continue to interpret the rich history of the Northern Piedmont region, and prepare for the Sesquicentennial commemoration of the American Civil War.

Funding for the project will come from a variety of sources. Much of the design and planning work has been funded by grants from the Virginia Legislature and the Merchant Trust which was set up exclusively to help fund the expansion.

The Historic Resources Board and the Manassas Museum Associates have formed a Capital Campaign Committee that seeks donations from individuals, community service organizations and corporations for this vital project.

The Museum Store strives to enhance the activities of the Museum System and its educational programming by contributing to the educational mission and financial health of the institution. Among the new items this year are four new Cats Meow Collectibles: Baldwin House at Swavely School, The Confederate Memorial at the City Cemetery, Manassas Baptist Church, and First Baptist Church. The store offers an exclusive selection of Cats Meow including the Historic Church & Albert Speiden Collections.

The Museum celebrated The Hopkins Candy Factory’s 100th Anniversary with a reproduction candy tin, available with hand-dipped chocolates or empty to fill with your own home made treats. The tin was designed by local artist Allan Guy.

The Museum developed two product lines-the *Heritage Collection* and *The Old Town Collection*-featuring images from the Museum’s archival collection and Old Town Manassas.

Each year the Museum offers a new, collectible ornament highlighting one of the area’s historic sites. The Stone House at the Manassas Battlefield was the subject of the ornament for 2007.

Celebrating Manassas’ rich railroad heritage, the Museum reproduced the Orange and Alexandria Railroad map that graces the gallery and is available for sale. In addition, renowned poster artist Patrick O’Brien created a Manassas Poster featuring the Depot with fireworks in the background.

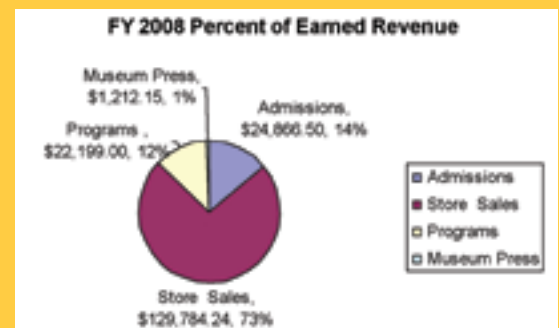
The Museum Store maintains an ecommerce site through the Museum System’s website. Patrons may purchase not only items from the store, but can order tickets for Museum events and camps for children.

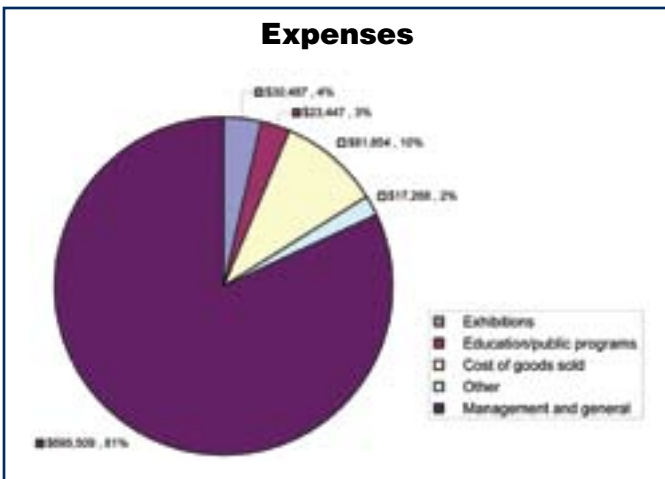

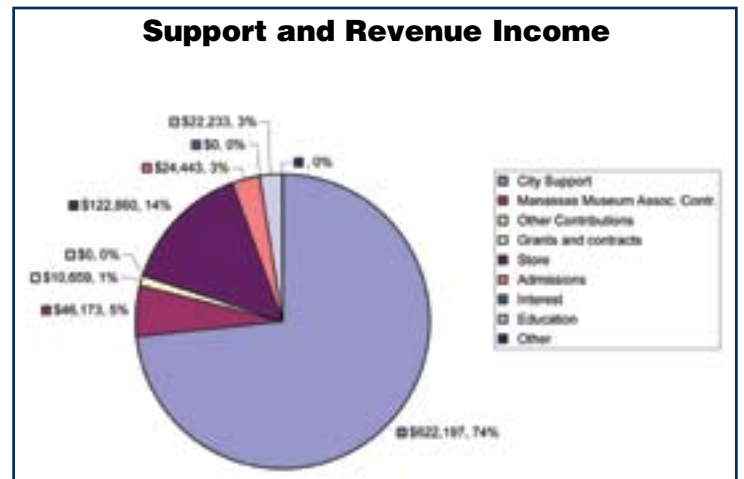
