## **National History Day**

In honor of National History Day, yes, that's a thing, City staff are working with classes at Metz Middle School and Osbourn High School to not only learn from history, but to make it. The theme of this year's National History Day, "Taking a Stand in History," helps to teach, prepare and inspire students from middle school through high school about critical thinking, problem-solving, research and reading, but most of all self-esteem and confidence.

As the Regional History Day Director for this area, Doug Horhota, Manassas Museum Program Coordinator, is working with students to participate in the regional competition and hopefully go on to the state and national competitions. The Museum is also hosting its own competition at the end of March as a local National History Day competition.

Students at Metz Middle School have worked hard to pick the perfect topics for the competitions. Metz student Darren Elkins has selected Human Rights Violations in North Korea. He said that even though most of the media focuses on North Korea's nuclear testing, they are overlooking the very severe abuses happening in North Korea. Stepping outside the box to research this project, Darren used web sites like Liberty North Korea and the United Nations.

Michelle Law, another student at Metz Middle School, said that her National History Day project has helped her connect to the present and has been a great learning experience. She is working on the dispute over the Spratly Islands in the North China Sea and has interviewed a Chinese citizen on the topic, as well as using college resources to research her topic.

Amelia Echeverria had a topic in mind, but was advised by her family to select another one. She decided that being a young woman, Women's Rights would be a great topic to explore. Her research centers on the Seneca Falls Convention all the way through the adoption of the 19th Amendment to the Constitution.

"Although we are researching the past," said Amelia Echeverria, "We are also taking a stand for ourselves in the present."

These and other National History Day displays will be available to view at the Manassas Museum on March 24-25. The regional competition is scheduled for the beginning of March, with the state competition in April and the National Competition in June. Good luck to our student historians.

# A Message from the City Manager

Over the past two years, about 1,000 randomly selected households have participated in a statistically valid community survey to give the City their thoughts on city services. These completed surveys give us a great deal of valuable information on residents' priorities and demonstrates a commitment to Manassas being a great place to live, work and play.

Some of the most telling information obtained from this survey is how the City of Manassas compares with the region and the country. It is a good idea to benchmark the City against other localities to see if we are on track with other communities. In the areas of quality of customer service and feeling of safety in business/commercial areas of the City, the City of Manassas ranked more than 20 percent above the region and the

United States.

What this survey tells us is where we are doing well and should keep up the good work and where we are perhaps, a bit lacking and should focus more attention in the years to come. As a matter of fact, if you drill down into the survey results, you will find maps that color-code the Citizen Satisfaction results by category, question and area of the City. This is an effective tool when researching how City staff may better serve our citizens and where to focus our efforts.


For example, if you look at the map of satisfaction with the ease of traveling from your home to regional roadways, most of the map is yellow, or neutral. This makes sense, as a consistent priority is transportation and getting you to


where you are going safely and efficiently. There are some corridors, like Route 28 in particular, that may take some time to improve, as we need to work with surrounding jurisdictions to improve the entire route.

In looking at a map illustrating satisfaction with

special events and festivals, you can see that the entire City is either very satisfied or satisfied. This is great news as the City works closely with Historic Manassas, Inc. to provide wonderful events and festivals all year long.

#### Spring RecycleFest - Saturday, April 1

The numbers are in and now everyone knows about RecycleFest! Residents diverted more than 143 tons of household hazardous waste, electronic waste, used clothing and shredded paper from landfills in 2016. Great job everyone! Don't forget to put Saturday, April 1 on your calendar for the Spring RecycleFest from 8 a.m.– 12 p.m. at the Manassas Transfer Station, 8305 Quarry Road (off Liberia Avenue), in Manassas.

During RecycleFest, City residents can drop off household hazardous waste, electronic waste and shred up to four boxes of paper documents, for free. Proof of residency is required to enter and no commercial waste will be accepted. Savers™ will once again be our special recycling guest. Savers™ is a well-established recycling power house that collects gently used clothing, accessories and household goods and helps to support communities by donating part of the proceeds to a local organization. This year, the Martin K. Alloy Boys & Girls Club of Manassas will receive a donation based on the total weight of the recycled items they receive. ## **New City Treasurer**

As your new Treasurer, I am so excited to announce that the School Bus Stop Arm Program is now live. After working out the logistics and coordinating with the Manassas City Police Department, Force Multiplier and Manassas City Public Schools, the Treasurer's Office is ready to collect the fees for those in violation of running the school bus stop arm.

Effective Jan. 5, 2017, anyone who passes an active school bus stop arm will receive a ticket in the mail. This

violation is subject to a \$250 fine. The ticket received by the violator will include instructions on how to remit payment.

We have all heard the many news reports of how often this violation occurs. I am particularly pleased that one of my first acts after assuming office is the expedited implementation of a system that will hold drivers accountable for jeopardizing the safety of our children. Proceeds from these violations will be invested in school funding.

With the new year and a new City Council in place, City staff have been working to transition to a new video product, Granicus, which will allow easier access to both streaming video and previous City Council meetings. This application provides viewers with
