City of Manassas Mayor Harry
J. Parrish II and the Manassas City
Council announce the appointment of
William Patrick Pate of High Point, N.C.
as the new city manager of the City of
Manassas, VA. Pate was selected from a
pool of highly qualified applicants after
thoughtful consideration and deliberation
by the City Council. Pate's first day as
City Manager will be Oct. 28.

"We welcome Pat to the City of Manassas and are eager to put his extensive public service experience to work for our residents," said Mayor Parrish.

"I am excited about coming to the City of Manassas and serving as the City Manager," said Pate. "I am looking forward to learning more about the City and getting to know the staff and community."

Prior to his appointment as city manager, Pate served as assistant city manager of the City of High Point, N.C., since 1999. High Point, N.C. has a population of 108,000 residents and a city staff of 1,565. As assistant city manager, Pate oversaw the activities of finance, budget and evaluation, customer service, communications, information technology, systems project administration, public services,

engineering services, facility services and parks and recreation. Before becoming assistant manager, Pate served as the budget and evaluation director for the City of Greensboro, N.C.

Pate received a double major
Bachelor of Arts degree in Political
Science and Religion from the University
of North Carolina, Chapel Hill and a
Masters of Public Administration from
the same. He is a credentialed manager
of the International City/County
Management Association (ICMA) and
a past-president of the Government
Finance Officers Association of the U.S.
and Canada.

Pat and his wife Sandra will be moving to the City of Manassas in the coming months. They have two sons, Will and Andrew, who are both college students.

The Manassas Regional Airport is a treasure for the City of Manassas. Do you know that in the last several years, the Airport has secured more than \$11 million in grants from the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and the Commonwealth?



Ash Tree Enemy #1

The Emerald Ash borer is the enemy to ash trees in Virginia. The City of Manassas horticulturalist spotted this intrusive insect in the City this summer. Already seen in Prince William and Fauquier Counties, this little beetle, originally from China, kills ash trees quickly. It arrived in Detroit in 2002, was seen in Virginia in 2003, but entomologists thought it was eradicated. It was seen again in 2008 and now, it is wide-spread. Shenandoah National Park confirmed the beetles' presence in the park as recently as Aug. 19, 2013.

Is there a natural solution to this pest?

There have been some reports that some native American wasps and some other insect-eating predators have discovered the Emerald Ash Borer as a

food source, but their impact to this pest is relatively small. Local, state, and federal agencies have been working to combat it by introducing a Chinese wasp who likes the Emerald Ash Borer as a food source. However, "the best control measures are tree removal and insecticides," says Eric Day, an entomologist and manager of the insect identification lab at Virginia Tech.

Ash trees make up less than five percent of Virginia's forest, but they serve a vital role in our ecosystem. "Ash trees are an important part of the ecosystem here," said Terry Lasher, Fauquier's senior area forester for the Virginia Department of Forestry. "They help maintain our water quality, provide shade, and are a heavy seeding tree which serves as a food source for smaller mammals."



What can you do?

According to Fauquier County's Extension agent, Tim Ohlwiler, check your ash trees for dead branches, which is the first sign. The beetle can take down a young tree within a year or so. Older trees can take longer, but that depends on how healthy the tree is. If you suspect you might have the Emerald Ash Borer, contact the Virginia Cooperative Extension office at 703-792-4371. They are tracking this enemy.


