Our Heroes - 2016 Valor Award Winners

At the recent Prince William Chamber of Commerce Valor Awards, three City of Manassas heroes were honored for Valor. The following are their stories:

Captain Andrew Carver, City of Manassas Fire and Rescue, was off duty the afternoon of Sept. 30, 2015. He was spending the day with his son, Nick. They were leaving their community in the Clifton area to run a few errands. As they approached the main road, they both noticed several people crowded together on the jogging path. It appeared that the crowd was standing over someone on the ground. Capt. Carver pulled to the side of the road and his instincts took over as he and Nick ran to the scene. They found an elderly man, unconscious, and a bystander giving chest compressions.

Capt. Carver announced himself as a Paramedic and proceeded to perform CPR. Nick was standing back a few feet with those who were watching the scene unfold. A few moments later, he was found kneeling on the ground praying for not only the unconscious man, or the group of onlookers, but also for his father; that his paramedic skills would help him in saving this man's life.

Nick, a preteen, provided an unexpected comfort to everyone at the scene, while Capt. Carver provided lifesaving care to the patient. While this type of incident is seen frequently by first responders, we must realize how traumatic it is to those who don't experience it each day. These two men were seen as heroes to the men and women on the jogging path that day. For his quick actions, Capt. Carver was awarded the Merit Award for Valor.

A Message from the City Manager



City Manager William Patrick Pate

As you read this, City Council is spending many hours at meetings reviewing and examining the proposed budget for FY 2017. Through this process, Council will prioritize the services that they deem to be the most important for the community and those that will have the most impact on future generations of residents.

The proposed budget is built to maintain the high quality of services and programs that you currently receive from the City. It is developed based on the City strategic plan and priorities and adheres to the sound financial practices and policies that have been adopted by City Council. The overall increase in the budget to provide these services is 0.5 percent.

Priorities for operational areas addressed in the proposed budget include a 2.625% increase in local funding for the Manassas City Public Schools; economic development incentives and a new position to promote community appearance; funding for body worn cameras for police officers; new voting machines as mandated by the General Assembly (these will also support a new precinct); and full funding for fire and rescue positions and police officers.

Capital investments priorities include moving forward with the new fire station approved last year and purchasing land for a future police facility under public safety; projects to maintain our utilities infrastructure; and transportation projects on Fairview Ave., Sudley Rd., Prince William St., Grant Ave., and Dean Dr. We will also continue to work to determine which recreation and cultural issues from the recent citizen satisfaction survey are the highest priorities for the community, such as amenities in the downtown, walking trails and planning for the future of Dean Park.

The advertised tax rate would result in about a 4 percent increase for the typical residential homeowner, but overall utility rates would fall by 2.2 percent for the same average residence. The \$1.9 million in new property tax revenues included in the proposed budget would support \$1.386 for Manassas City Public Schools, \$296,000 for police body worn cameras, \$92,000 for voting machines and \$125,000 for reductions in late payment penalties or additional tax abatements for the elderly and handicapped.

A \$3.5 million reduction in utility costs and corresponding utility revenues in FY 2017 will offset some of the increase in taxes.

Our Heroes - 2016 Valor Award Winners - Continued

On Saturday, May 16, 2015, officers were sent to a report of a suicidal subject who was armed with a shotgun. Prince William County received the initial call and kept the subject on the line while city dispatchers relayed the information to the responding officers. It was determined that the individual was an armed forces veteran and was suffering from PTSD. His girlfriend had also recently passed away and he was having difficulty dealing with the loss.

Units arrived on scene and a perimeter was established, while dispatch continued to talk to the subject who was inside of his house. Manassas City Senior Police Officer (SPO) J.R. Lehman positioned himself near the front of the house while instructions were given to the subject on how to step outside to speak with the officers on scene. The subject indicated that he was scared of the police and was uneasy about what was going to happen when he came outside. After about 30 minutes, the subject walked out to the front porch area holding a shotgun.

SPO Lehman, who has received training in crisis intervention, spoke to the subject in a calm manner so as not to startle him. Lehman was able to gather basic information and began to establish a rapport with the subject. SPO Lehman continued to talk with the subject and attempted to have him place the gun on the ground, however, the subject was reluctant to do so.

After a short time, Manassas City
Senior Police Officer Y. Sturman, who
is also trained in crisis intervention,
met SPO Lehman near the front of the
house. SPO Sturman took over the role
of primary negotiator. She and SPO
Lehman worked together to keep the
subject calm while trying to resolve the
situation safely. SPO Sturman gathered
additional information about the
problems that the subject was having and
worked to gain his trust. She explained to
him that she would be able to guide him
through the process of getting help.

By gaining his trust, SPO Sturman was able to convince the subject to place

the weapon on the ground in a safe manner before having him move to a location where officers were able to detain him.

Through the use of their CIT training and by displaying a calm and reassuring demeanor, both Officers Lehman and Sturman brought a safe resolution to a situation that easily could have resulted in a loss of life. For these actions, SPO Lehman and SPO Sturman were awarded the Bronze Medal of Valor.
